### *A Letter From The Reverend Rob Banse, Jr.*

Dear Friends,  
I write to you from Sewanee, Tennessee. I am in the midst of the second summer session of the Doctor of Ministry program. For those of you who know the University of the South, the Domain (the campus) is as beautiful as ever and it is good to be back.

Being here reinforces my sense that one of the big and audacious goals we are called to work toward at Trinity is that of spiritual formation and growth. The time has come to acknowledge the fact that this faith we have been given does not come by osmosis. Simply because we have been baptized and consider ourselves in some fashion to be “Christian” does not necessarily make this so. Prayer, study, and the opportunity to engage in discussion and debate with our community, and within our community, are essential if you and I are to move beyond a nominal understanding of who we are. That is why I want to uphold a vision for our congregation that makes these

kinds of disciplines central to our mission, goals, and objectives. If the world is to be engaged with the Gospel going forward into the twenty-first century, it will take disciples of this Good News who are wise and discerning as well as loving and caring.

Summer is a great season in which to reflect on these matters. I am a proponent of reading widely and deeply. Obviously, one needs the time to do so and our busy lives often leave little opportunity to engage in this practice. I am therefore a huge fan of summer reading lists, the “beach read”, and the idea of filling a suitcase full of books and hauling them off to an island cottage or mountain cabin for immersion. My friends, God gave us minds for a reason. I think it best if we take God up on the offer and make good use of them.

Some of you have asked for suggestions for this summer’s reading list. Let me offer two drawn from the syllabi of the courses I am taking.

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### *Christian Education*

Friends,

This article may be more appropriate around Annual Meeting (October 17), but I just cannot hold it in any longer. 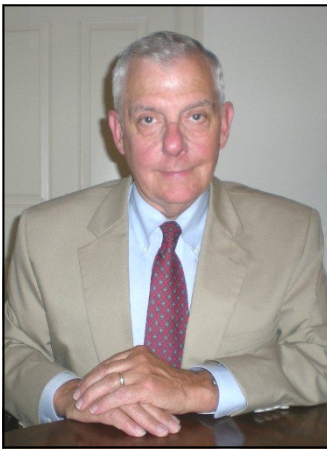
# Class of 2013 Vestry Nominees

## *Stewardship of the Sabbath*

In the book The Three Boxes of Life, and How to Get Out of Them, author Richard Bolles notes that we tend to live our lives in a linear and sequential manner. We spend our youth in pursuit of EDUCATION, our adulthood devoted to our WORK, and our retirement enjoying RELAXATION. Bolles' thesis is that we would live happier and more harmonious lives if we could achieve a balance of education, work, and relaxation throughout *all* the seasons of our lives.

Stewardship may also be thought of in terms of sequential seasons. In the beginning of the year during Epiphany and Lent, we focus on the Stewardship of CREATION – that is, on being good stewards of our environment. With the coming of spring, we give our time to the Stable Tour and thusly have a spe-

cial opportunity to exercise the Stewardship of TIME. During summer we focus on the Stewardship of SABBATH. Interestingly, the primary meaning of this word is not "to rest" in terms of relaxing or rejuvenating, but rather "to cease." We remember the Sabbath to keep it holy because to do so is to obey one of the Ten Commandments. In Genesis 2, God stopped His physical labors, *not* because He was tired, but because He was setting an example for us. Finally, in the autumn, we are called once again to exercise the Stewardship of TREASURE – more about *that* later!

Perhaps there is a lesson in Richard Bolles' book that can be applied to the way we exercise our call to Christian Stewardship. While it is a worthwhile endeavor to focus particular attention on the various components of Steward-

ship during their respective seasons, by being mindful and intentional about combining the stewardship of our TIME, TALENT, TREASURE, and SABBATH all year long, we demonstrate obedience, and acknowledge God's sovereignty over all that we possess.

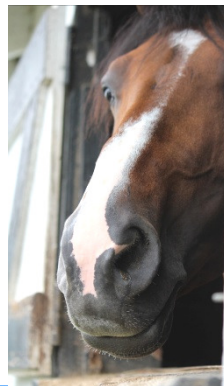

The first is Brian McLaren's *A Generous Orthodoxy*. McLaren is one of the leaders of "the emergent church" movement. What I have discovered thus far is that this movement is difficult to define and describe. Nonetheless, it is present and powerful and takes seriously trying to engage the younger generations with the Gospel in an increasingly secular age. I promise you that you will find certain aspects of the book both unsettling and off-putting. But again, if we choose to read only those books that support our particular point of view, we aren't really growing, are we?

The second book was written by one of my favorite New Testament Scholars, Raymond E. Brown. In *The Churches The Apostles Left Behind*, Brown traces the challenges and disputes present in the earliest Christian communities as evidenced in the writings of the Evangelists and the authors of the New Testament letters. I find his essays helpful in the midst of the Church's present difficulties in that he reminds us that

working through such difficulties has always been part of the life of the Christian community. I'm not sure why, but I take some comfort and find hope in that reality.

I want to close this letter on a personal note. As many of you know, Janie's father, The Rev. Holland Ball Clark, died on June 11<sup>th</sup>. Holland was a great person and will be greatly missed by his spouse, Jane, and his family and friends. We thank you for your cards, letters, calls, and prayers. I am not "a wind beneath your wings" kind of guy, but it has always meant the world to me to know good people who have lived life faithfully, fully and well. Holland was just such a person, just such a child of God. He will always be an inspiration to me. Dutch, I am proud to be called your son-in-law. Please save me a place.

## Notes From Christian

One of the less visible but important parts of my job as Director of Music Ministries is to manage the use of the church for musical purposes beyond our regular worship. This includes coordinating everything from guest concerts, to other church choirs holding retreats here. As you can imagine, given our unique facilities, there are many such requests. On one hand, I try to be very selective, weeding out those who would use the church for secular purposes or nothing more than their own personal gain. There are several criteria involved but the most important, by far, is whether the event furthers the mission of the local or global church. On the other hand, for the church to support church musicians or events that meet this criterion is an important form of outreach and I try to be as generous as possible.

A recent example of this is the annual visit by the Church Music Institute from Shenandoah Conservatory. The Institute is a two week long church music workshop held each summer for students of church music at the college and as continuing education for church music professionals. Each summer they spend a day at Trinity holding classes and lectures in the parish hall and church, strolling the beautiful grounds, playing the organ, and ending with an evening worship service planned and implemented by the participants. This year their featured clinician was Paul Westermeyer, head of the Master of Sacred Music program at Luther Seminary in conjunction

with St. Olaf College and highly respected author and authority on music in the church.

It is always a joy for me to spend the day with the Church Music Institute. We are near the top of the game for church music in this area and have a great deal to offer these students who are relatively new to the field. This is the type of ministry that many of them aspire to. At the end of the day both participants and the workshop organizers are always very appreciative of our hosting their visit. The leaders of the institute who are aware of just how many such events we open our doors to are especially grateful. I am their pointman and the one present at the time and thus the recipient of most of their gratitude, leading to the occasional joke about my being the Robin Hood of church music. Of course that is not the case. We as a church are well aware of our many unique blessings and rather than give in to the temptation of

exclusivity, we welcome the opportunity to share what we have been so graciously given. In doing so, we support church professionals, present and future, in the development of their ministry and further our own mission as well. And so, on behalf of Trinity Church, I will continue to welcome church musicians from all corners to partake of this special place, and on behalf of the many who do, I pass on their thanks to you, the church, and assure you that your generosity will bear much fruit for the Kingdom of God.

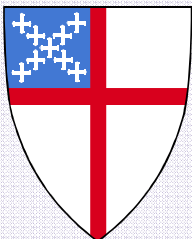

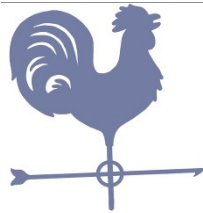

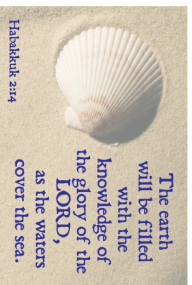
