### *A Letter From The Reverend Rob Banse, Jr.*

Dear Friends,  
Our family has just returned from a week at the beach. During that time, I read a wonderful book by Rachel Carson entitled, "The Edge of the Sea". She writes with great eloquence about the abundance of life found at the point where ocean and shoreline meet. At the heart of that abundance is the eternal ebb and flow of the tide. Without the tides, this life would cease to exist.

Carson has reminded me that there is ebb and flow within the life of the Church as well. The Holy Spirit carries us out into the world during the course of the week. Here, we engage with family and friends, colleagues and neighbors. Here, we have the opportunity to do the work God has given us to do, that is, loving God by loving and caring for those we meet in the swirl of life.

But on Sundays, and at other times as well, we are lifted by that same Spirit and are drawn into the worship of our Christian community. Here, we re-center ourselves by hearing the word of God, examining our souls and our lives, asking for the forgiveness of our sins, singing God's praises, and

being nourished once again with the bread and the wine that is for us the body and blood of our Savior. Worship is the focal point of our life together in Jesus Christ. It is our high tide.

It is not surprising that over the centuries the Church has incorporated nautical touches into the architecture of its buildings. For example, the main body of a church is often referred to as "the nave". That term is drawn from the Latin for "ship." Likewise, many churches are designed to look like upside down ships. If you half-close your eyes and look up into the rafters of our beautiful worship space, you will see what I mean.

The point I am trying to make is this: We have been blessed over the last fifty years with a glorious ship in which to ride the high tide of worship. Thanks to the efforts and talents of many, and most especially Mr. and Mrs. Paul Mellon, we gather together in a sacred building that truly reflects the beauty of God's creation and reminds us of the power and grace of God's story.

## Stewardship of the Treasure

Readers of Genesis may remember that, in recognition of Stewardship as a year-round endeavor, our focus has been divided into four categories:

1. Winter – Stewardship of Creation
2. Spring – Stewardship of our Time
3. Summer – Stewardship of the Sabbath; and
4. Fall – Stewardship of our Treasure.

The term “Treasure” refers to our financial resources, however great or small they may be. Experience has shown time and again that there is little if any correlation between the size of our “Treasure” and the degree of our happiness. The Bible is filled with a vast number of instructions as to how we are to behave as custodians of what we have. The instructions do not deal with what God needs from us. (God doesn’t have a cash flow problem). The instructions are intended to help us move toward a right relationship with our Creator.

Stewardship is recognition that God is the rightful owner of everything, and that we are caretakers of His world, responsible to do with it what He wants to have done. *“The earth is the Lord’s, and everything in it, the world, and all who live in it.”* Psalm 24:1.

The Bible gives us a number of reasons why Christians should give their money. One such reason is apostolic command: *“But just as you excel in everything – in faith, in speech, in knowledge, in complete earnestness and in your love for us – see that you also excel in this grace of giving.”* 2 Cor. 8:7.

But above all else, Christians give because doing so is a natural response to the realization of the Gospel of God’s Grace.

Because God has given His Son, it is only fitting that we should offer ourselves as sacrifices to Him *“Therefore, I urge you, brothers, in view of God’s mercy, to offer your bodies as living sacrifices, holy and pleasing to God – this is your spiritual act of worship.”* Romans 12:1. We don’t give solely in order that the spiritual activities of Trinity Church can be made possible. **The act of giving is an integral part of the spiritual activities** of Trinity Church! This is not putting too fine a point on it. **The act of giving is a spiritual exercise.** We do not give fearfully in order to receive God’s grace, but rather we give joyfully because we have **already** received God’s grace.

We can all benefit from a refresher course on the Bible’s teachings about Stewardship. We all know the Christmas and Easter stories, and yet we re-visit them annually in their respective seasons. Stewardship deserves no less a place in the Christian calendar. What does the Old Testament say about Tithing? Do the New Testament teachings of Jesus and the Apostles reinforce these teachings? How will I know if I am in alignment with God’s will? How much should I give? Who has knowledge of how much I give? (Almost no one, your pledge is between yourself and God). Do I give my first fruits or my leftovers? (OK, everybody gets easy points on that question). These and other teachings

will be addressed in the months ahead.

Let us invite the Holy Spirit into our hearts to prepare our hearts and minds to be stretched to a new place of sacrificial giving and living – beyond what we thought might be possible. In the words of Jesus, *“For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.”* Luke 12:34.

Sometimes the Church is a parishioner stopping by my cluttered office to see how my day is going.

You see, my cup overflows with the realization that Christ is alive, God does exist, and that the Church is so much more than I sometimes think it is. I pray that I can have the wisdom and the strength to live a life that says I am the Church, You are the Church, We are the Church together.

By this, of course, I mean I hope we will see you on Sunday mornings; but I also mean so much more. Come to Church. Come to Trinity to seek, form, build, fill and wallow in the Church that I see around me.

## *Notes From Christian*


As we prepare to celebrate the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the first services in our splendid church building, I can't help but remember a comment I heard in my first years here. "Trinity Church has an edifice complex." On one hand, it is a sentiment that rings true for me. It can be easy to fall into the trap of focusing entirely too much on the beauty of our buildings and become obsessed with the superficial trappings of religion rather than the mission and work of the people. And yet, the value of such a tremendous gift is inescapable. The church buildings and campus are truly a work of architectural art for all ages, filled with ancient signs and symbols that can draw us closer to God. The ceiling and steeple reaching towards heaven, the biblical windows, the carvings and cruciform shape all serve a higher purpose. They draw people in, enhance our spirituality, magnify the story of God's people, and the exceptional quality and craftsmanship are a unique example of offering the best we are capable of.

When I first became Music Director here, a similar dilemma was debated. As we contemplated the future of music at Trinity Church, we weighed musical excellence with accessible participation. In particular, should we allow only trained musicians to sing

in the choir or have it open and welcoming to all who would make the effort, possibly sacrificing some musical quality? It is my hope and belief that by offering ample time to teach and nurture the participants that the music of the church can be both welcoming to all and of the highest quality.

And so, I am especially pleased that this Fall, as we celebrate our buildings, we also begin a renewed commitment to Christian Education. It shows that we are a parish that can foster both of these important ministries and that they can be mutually supportive. In our Parish Profile, it says about our buildings and campus, "it challenges us to a faith that can match its strength and beauty and makes us a discerning, welcoming, and inviting people". At the same time, a strong Christian Education Ministry will, among other things, challenge us to see and use our edifice as yet another instrument of God's peace and not just a really pretty building. I look forward to the church fully supporting both these important ministries and to another fifty years of them supporting each other.

## NEED MONEY FOR A GOOD CAUSE? OUTREACH WANTS TO HEAR FROM YOU!

In 2010, Trinity Church has already financially supported S.O.M.E. (So Others May Eat); Middleburg FISH (For Immediate and Sympathetic Help); LAWS (Loudoun Abused Women's Shelter); ESL (English as a Second Language); 3 College Scholarships; and MAP International. An example of a project request made to Outreach was for MAP International Travel Packs (large boxes of medicine with a wholesale value of over \$12,000 which are sold to qualifying non-profits at a cost of \$500 per pack). The 3 parishioners who went to Kilonga, Kenya in July on a mission trip were able to hand carry 2 Travel Packs to the Kinarani Health Center. Trinity Church paid \$1,000 for the medicine, and the Kenyan village clinic received \$24,000 worth of needed medical supplies!

The Outreach Committee encourages anyone who has a project or organization in financial need that is making a positive difference in our community, our region or internationally to submit the project for funding consideration. The process is easy and submission is open to everyone — parishioners as well as those outside our congregation. You can mail, email or drop off the Request for Outreach Funding Form at the church office. The forms are available online ([www.trinitychurch.org](http://www.trinitychurch.org) — click on Outreach — forms are on the right column) or paper forms can be found near the bulletin board in Cox Hall. We ask all requests be sub-

mitted in writing **NO LATER THAN OCTOBER 4<sup>th</sup>**. We will carefully review each request and prepare our final recommendation to the Vestry the first week of November. Disbursement of Vestry approved funds will occur by Thanksgiving.

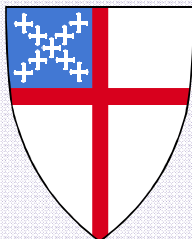

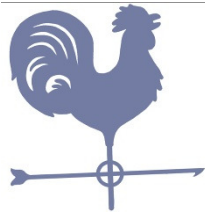
