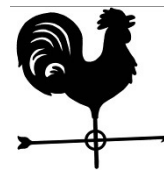


# GENESIS



*A Message of New Life*

*November 2009*

**Dear Friends,**

The Stewardship Committee has asked that I include this homily in the November Genesis. I am happy to do so. Here goes:

Last week, Stephanie Knapp spoke to you with great eloquence on the subject of stewardship. She made a number of excellent points. As far as I am concerned, one of the most important was the reminder that this Christian life that you and I share is holistic. That is, no matter how often and how much you and I try to partition our spiritual lives from our life in the world, and our prayers from our possessions, it can't be done. To truly follow Christ involves all that we are and all that we have all of the time. This week, I want to build on Stephanie's words and speak specifically about the meaning of the tithe. We have all heard of the tithe and tithing before but we may not understand what it's all about. That's what I want to focus on this morning.

As Stephanie shared with us, stewardship is central to the understanding the Christian view of the world. What we gather from both the Old Testament and the New is this: Stewardship is not so much about giving away part of our possessions as it has to do with accepting the responsibility for possessions that have been entrusted to us by God. Stewardship, properly understood, is about management. We are not the owners. All the resources we are given – our time, our

abilities, and our possessions - all are entrusted to us by God. We are not "Masters of the Universe", a la Tom Wolf's "Bonfire of the Vanities". We do not create wealth. We have been given these resources by a giving God who, in turn, calls us to manage them wisely and with love for others. In short, we are stewards of God's grace, not masters of God's riches. That is the vocation we all share. No matter what day jobs we hold, we are all stewards of God's grace.

What do we believe about the true owner of this vineyard we call the world? Again, God is a giving God. God has created the heavens and the earth. God has created us, you and me, in God's image. And when we had really gone astray, God gave us His Son so that we might not perish but instead gain eternal life.

Do you remember Jesus' parable about the Good Samaritan? It is a story about stewardship. It is a story about approaching our sisters and brothers in need with compassion and caring for them as God's stewards. The parable of the Good Samaritan is one of the best known and most loved of Jesus' stories because it speaks the truth about who we are and what our lives are really all about.

So why is it that we are so afraid of this truth? I think it has to do with the fact that, while we profess our faith in the love of God each Sunday, our trust is so often

placed elsewhere. We want to believe that we can build fortresses against all the threats present in this world and that in these fortresses we can become Masters of our own Universe. But all the fortresses you and I build are built on sand and one day these fortresses will come crashing down. We are not a people created by God to build fortresses. We are a people created for a journey, a journey in which we place our trust in the one God and our love in God's Son and each other. Stop and think about it. It is for good reason that Jesus says to us where your treasure is, there your heart will be also. Where are our hearts today?

We are stewards who put our trust in God.

Now, what about the tithe? Well, let me first say what tithing is not:

The tithe is not paying one's dues.

It is not the temple tax.

It is not an annual subscription in one's favorite non-profit.

It is not about guilt.

It is not about penance.

It is not bartering with God. It is not about buying God's favor because God's favor has already been freely given to us.

I believe that tithing is a gift from God. Specifically, tithing (returning to God's service a portion of what God has given to us) is a discipline that strengthens an attitude of faith that in turn frees us from the fears that so often diminish our experience of the life that God

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## STEWARDSHIP

The biggest obstacle The biggest obstacle we must overcome in our attitude

toward giving is pride – the pride of imagining ourselves to be owners. Let us humbly pray each day to see ourselves not as owners, but as the temporary stewards of God's abundant blessings.

Please keep the bottom third of your pledge card as a thank you for your sacrifice, and as a daily invitation to pray for our parish. Don't overlook the most important pledge of all – there is a box that reads "I will commit to pray for the Stewardship of Trinity Church." Like all the information on the pledge card, this commitment is private, between yourself and God.

has given us. As the resident theologian in the Banse household, Janie pointed out the other day that the tithe is about a thankful heart and with a thankful heart there is no room for fear and anxiety. You can't be thankful and fearful at the same time.

You see, one of the greatest constraints we can put upon ourselves when it comes to enjoying abundant life is a miserly attitude in our relationship with God and with each other. Today's story about Bartimaeus is about Jesus healing our blindness. God wants us to see clearly and tithing is about seeing clearly. Tithing is about planned giving. It is about intentionally and with discipline giving to the mission of Jesus Christ as opposed to giving as an afterthought or with no thought at all.

The tithe historically has been understood to be returning at least 10% of what we have received from God for the sake of others on an annual basis. Some of the key biblical passages include Leviticus 27:30-33, Deuteronomy 14:22-29, Malachi 3:6-12, Luke 11:41-42, and Matthew 23:23.

For many of us, giving a definite percentage from the "first fruits" of our annual income sounds like a scary prospect, even if we realize that that still leaves much of the income for our own use. Again, tithing is a discipline given to us by God in order to heal us even as we seek to care for others. And like any form of exercise, we must grow into it. We don't start running on a Monday and go out to do a marathon the following Saturday. My hope and prayer is that we will all be proactive when it comes to

tithing. Think about it. Pray about it. Talk with God and your family about the percentage you would want to strive for in the coming year and stay with it. Please remember that this commitment is entirely between God and yourselves. Whether you decide upon 5%, 10%, or 50% and whether you base it upon gross or net is entirely between you and the Holy Spirit. The whole point is to truly experience the joy of being a steward of God's grace as we journey through this life.

## Christian Ed & Youth Ministry: *Drew Colby*

Friends,

As many of you know I am in seminary right now at Wesley Seminary in Washington, DC. Honestly, I am really loving my experience there. I love almost everything about it: Wesley Choir and Hebrew Bible on Mondays, staying over in the city on Monday nights with old college buddies, attending chapel worship and Church History class on Tuesdays. Then comes my Wednesday night class, Covenant Discipleship—a 7:30-9:30 class for which I leave Upperville at 5:30. It's about 3 hours of driving for 2 hours of class and it's been hard for me not to dread it. Each week, however, I seem to walk away from that class with some morsel of wisdom to chew on for the week and that introspection makes the 3-hour commute worth it.

On a recent Wednesday night I attended my Covenant Discipleship class (yes, discipleship is a *class* in seminary which I originally found very odd) where we discussed two spiritual disciplines or practices: fasting and simplicity—interesting topics with Thanksgiving and Christmas on the horizon. After a long discussion about fasting, our professor said “You know, we

may not know how to fast in this country, but I'm pretty sure we don't know how to *feast* either.” This statement was followed by deep groans of disagreement. Afterward, on the drive home, I think I grasped his point and I now have a new definition of a feast and I still plan to celebrate it on this month's fourth Thursday.

Thanksgiving is a day when I and many Americans eat until we can't move, then get up for seconds or thirds, then sit on the couch and watch as much football as we can until we fall asleep until waking just in time for another turkey sandwich or two before we go to bed. It's a day of feasting, right? I'm not so sure anymore. Now I'm worried that feasting as a spiritual discipline or a means of grace might not mean “All I Can Eat” or “all I can consume” or “all I can own”. Feasting might be about relationships and gratitude. Feasting might mean celebrating a meal with those you love, friends as well as enemies, and acknowledging the level to which our “cups overflow”. This Thanksgiving (an English word for *eucharist*), join me as I try to feast on all I can feast, by being grateful for all I can and loving as many as I can as much as I can.

## Change a Life: *Judy Washburn*

The Windy Hill Foundation oversees a program that includes children of their residents and also children at Middleburg Elementary who are in dire need of someone to help them just one hour a week (or if you have time two hours) The times are from 3:00 PM to 4:00 PM on Mondays or Thursdays or both if you happen to be available. There are trained staff to provide you with the material. All that is needed is your interest and caring to help a child with homework, reading and the feeling of being special. Claire Louis, the Resident Services Manager for the Windy Hill Foundation, administers the program and asks that you come about 15 minutes early to receive whatever materials are needed to help the child that particular day.

The word “tutor” kept me from volun-

teering for several years as did my travel schedule, but I found that being a “Study Buddy” didn't mean I had to have been a good student (which I wasn't) or have experience (which I didn't). I also found that there are substitutes willing to fill in when I travel (which used to be a lot). What is really needed is just someone who cares and is willing to share an hour or two of their time each week. The teachers at Middleburg Elementary will be happy to tell you what a difference this program has made in the lives of so many children

over the past few years. I know that I have gotten more out of this program than I have given. Please think about joining Ann MacLeod, Dan Haney, Robin Keys and other Trinity members who have made reached out to the children of our community in need. Many thanks!

## Giant Chairs, Giant Rats, and Giant Bells:

Have you seen the short spot on PBS about the world's largest chair which resides on a corner in Anacostia? The chair was built by a furniture company in Southeast and was installed on the roof of the factory as an advertisement. Eventually the company closed but the chair remained, becoming something of a local landmark. Recently, a community group has saved the chair from imminent deterioration and given it a new home on the corner of a park. While watching the show I was ready to make a pilgrimage to this greatest symbol of rest when the commentator quietly added the caveat that while at the time of construction this was the world's largest chair, it has now been exceeded by several other giant seats around the country. The disappointment reminded me of going to the Frederick County Fair many years ago and paying a dollar to see the world's largest rat only to find out that it was actually a South American Capybara which is the world's largest species of rodent but most definitely not a rat.

World's largest, world's

best, greatest in all the world. It is unfortunate that these expressions often get used quite loosely. Taking unjustified liberties like this can lead to disappointment and lack of credibility when something truly is the



world's largest or best. It is the "boy who cried wolf" syndrome. And it is that I personally vow to use this term accurately.

This winter, Trinity Church will be hosting a concert by the Westminster Concert Bell Choir of Westminster Choir College in Princeton NJ. In past years we have been blessed to host concerts by several of Westminster's vocal choirs who are "among" the best choirs in the world. The Concert Bell Choir can also claim this distinction. However, what is an indisputable fact is that

they play the world's largest set of handbells covering a full eight octaves from C1-C9. The smallest is the size of a thimble, the largest the size of a very melodious garbage can. By comparison, it is twice the size of Trinity's four octave set of handbells.

The concert will be in the church Monday, Jan. 11 at 7:30 pm. I realize that it may seem early to be promoting a concert in January but with all the busyness of the holidays between now and then, I want to make sure that everyone has this date on their calendars. We host a Westminster Concert almost every year, and each time people who did not come tell me they heard how

excellent it was and if only they had known. Westminster Choir College is the premier school in this country for choral and church music. All of their choirs are among the best in the world. Mark your calendars now, tell your friends, and don't miss the Westminster Concert Bell Choir playing the world's largest set of handbells right here in Upperville. I promise this is no giant rat. You will not be disappointed.

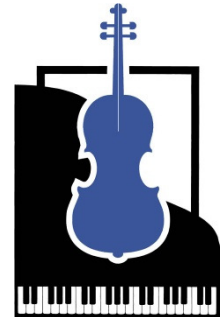

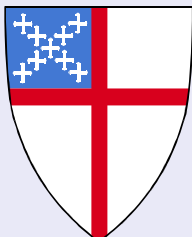
