### Dear Friends,

As reported this past Sunday morning, Barbara Augenblick and I have just returned from the Annual Council of the Episcopal Diocese of Virginia. It was one of the best councils I have ever attended over the years. We focused on some wonderful stories about new and exciting ministries taking place around the diocese in places where, only recently, these very same congregations had been struggling to even survive. It was, in a word, inspiring.

Now, I happen to believe that one of the primary experiences we are looking for when we come to church is inspiration. We want to know that God is with us. We want to participate in God's love, grace, and peace. Furthermore, we seek guidance and encouragement in living life the way we know, deep down, we are called to live, and seek strength to meet the challenges, trials, and tribulations that come our way.

We also know, deep down, that this is not something that we can do alone. Just as we need God, so we also need each other. It is not by accident that Jesus begins his ministry by calling others to come and join him. While I certainly have known moments of inspiration apart from community, I also know that the more numerous and most profound experiences have been with the church: in the beauty of the liturgy, in the conversations that take place with sisters and brothers in Christ, in the work we do together in making the love of God incarnate for the sake of others.

Therefore, it should come as no surprise that the root meaning of the word, "inspire," comes from the Latin root meaning, "to breathe in the spirit of God." In other words, when we seek to live in the Holy Spirit, to breath deeply the love of God revealed in Jesus Christ, then we are oxygenated in such a way that we can do "infinitely more than we can ask or imagine" and know great joy in doing so. On the other hand, when we simply try to go it alone, without that inspiration, the air we take in gets stale pretty quickly and the experience of suffocation sets in. To put it simply, true inspiration requires a living relationship with God that is shared with others breathing in that same spirit. That's why our life together here at Trinity is so very important.

By the time the next Genesis appears, we will be at the doorstep of the season we call "Lent." I encourage you to be praying even now about what shape your Lenten journey will take this year, what you will do during those forty days that will inspire you in your relationship with God, and allows God to inspire you. In the meantime, may you and I continue to live together in the presence of the Holy Spirit, finding the abundant life Christ offers to those who learn to breathe deeply.

## Vestry Notes

Gina Hammond, Senior Warden

The Vestry held its regularly scheduled meeting on January 15, 2014. The Rector began with opening prayers. Becky Hoecker shared a meditation with the group on "The Golden Rule".

The minutes of the December 16, 2013 Vestry meeting were approved as submitted. This document is available on the bulletin board in Cox Hall.

Treasurer Charles Ince gave a review of the unaudited profit and loss statement for 2013. Good management by the Staff and Committee Chairs was reflected in yearly expenses of \$901,187.55, well below the budgeted amount of \$933,384. The Rector and Vestry recognized with very thankful hearts the generosity of the church members. During December, 2013, pledge payments, plate offerings, special gifts and a successful Christmas Auction resulted in over \$132,000 of income received. The annual income for 2013 totaled \$989,857.60 thereby resulting in a net surplus of \$88,670.05. WE ARE SO BLESSED!!!

New Business Items included:

- A discussion of the Budget by Mission Category - The Rector began with an overview of the currently adopted draft 2014 budget. He reminded us that the budget is a "Statement of Faith". It serves as a mission statement of our church priorities. The five largest budget items are:
  - I. Staff (Personnel)
  - 2. General Administration
  - 3. Buildings and Grounds
  - 4. Outreach
  - 5. Worship

For January, a more extended discussion was begun on the Staff category. The Rector is content with the structure of our staff. Trinity is blessed to have a dedicated group of individuals who perform their assignments very well. He reminded us that the staff is not the professional ministry of the church. They are simply enablers to us to assist us in doing the work of the church. They support our efforts to evangelize across our congregation and our community. The Vestry will continue to examine the other budget categories in future meetings to be sure their expenses support our priorities.

- In light of the generosity of our parishioners, there is now a surplus to be applied to the 2014 budget. The previously projected deficit of \$35,344.60 has been eliminated. All Vestry members were asked to review their current committee budgets and submit requests for changes to the Finance Committee. This committee will make recommendations at the February 2014 Vestry meeting for application of surplus funds and provide a revised 2014 budget.
- The Worship Committee brought forth a design for a votive candle stand to be placed in the Chapel. This idea has been contemplated for several years. A design has been prepared but the information provided was insufficient for Vestry action. The Worship committee will secured additional data to address the questions raised and bring a revised proposal for action.

- If approved, the stand will be paid for from resources in the "Book of Remembrance".
- Richard McPherson has agreed to become our regular organist. A Letter of Agreement is being prepared.
- Bob Appenzeller gave a report of his recent visit to Haiti, and in particular, Helping Haitian Angels (HHA), the orphanage that some of our outreach funds support. There are plans for significant growth of the facilities for HHA. Bob is preparing a more extensive report to the Outreach Committee so that they may better understand this growth and how it may impact future resources we may give them.

There was no Old Business to present.

Committee reports were received as submitted. Additional comments follow:

- Stewardship Report Gina Hammond reported that commitment cards continue to be received. As of lanuary 14, 2014, 166 commitments have been recorded totaling \$547,266. We are well on our way toward receiving 200 commitments and achieving \$600,000 in 2014 income.
- Margaret Moore reviewed several plans of the Parish Life Committee to include:
  - Feb 14-16: Trinity Art Show
  - Mar 2 Newcomers Coffee Hour
  - Mar 4 Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper
  - Apr 20 Easter Sunday Coffee Hour

- Plans for the Parish Retreat at Shrine Mont are being made. We have secured the dates of June 27-29, 2014. Pamela Wynfield will be coordinating this event.
- Minutes of the Cemetery Committee were also received. Alex Woodson has been elected to the board for a term to end in 2016.

Gina Hammond gave the Wardens Report. She again extended thanks to Pamela Wynfield, Betsy Crenshaw, Cindy Thompson and the many volunteers for the very successful Christmas Auction. John Knouse and Betsy Crenshaw were thanked for the wonderful Christmas Pageant given by the youth. The Rec-

tor, the Worship Committee, and its many subcommittees also were thanked for the majestic Christmas and Epiphany services attended by over 800 individuals. Gina also reported that the results of the recent Safety Inspection conducted by the Diocese were received. Recommendations have been forwarded to the Worship and Buildings and Grounds Committees for appropriate action.

The meeting was concluded by the Rector. He gave a brief overview of the plans for the weekly Epiphany Wednesday Bible Study. The topic will be "The Development of Christian Beliefs". The discussion will center on the origins of Christian belief. Where did the writings of the New Testament come from? How was it decided what books would be included in the Bible that we use? What were the origins of the creeds? Did all Christians hold the same views from the beginning or were there competing understandings of the Christ event? All are welcome to join in.

The meeting concluded with a final prayer. The next Vestry meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, February 17, 2014 at 6:30 pm.


One of the responsibilities of

## In Defense of Ordinary Time

Tucked between the pageantry of Christmas and the fanfare of Easter is my favorite part of the liturgical year. Ordinary time begins on the Monday following the first Sunday after the Epiphany and runs through the day before Ash Wednesday and the beginning of Lent. It picks up again the day after Pentecost and continues until the first Sunday of Advent when the liturgical year starts over again.

The term, ordinary time, is derived from the Sundays being numbered as in "ordinal numbers" which are numbers in a series. While the name has nothing to do with being average or unexceptional, there is coincidentally some truth to that and for me is part of it's appeal. I often think that Jesus would be

appalled by all the fuss we make over the major Christian holidays such as Christmas where our grand celebrations can easily miss the point entirely of a humble and quiet birth in a lowly manger. However, the lessons during Ordinary Time focus on what I believe is the truly important part of the story; the life and teachings of Jesus. It is here we actually learn about the Kingdom of God through the parables and the Sermon on the Mount among others. Another plus for me is that the Gospel lessons during Ordinary Time focus on the synoptic Gospels of Mark, Matthew, and Luke, largely leaving out John who, just between you and me, I find to be a bit overly verbose and full of himself, but I'll save that for another article. Yet another bonus is the liturgical

color for Ordinary Time is Green, my favorite color.

During these winter months, as we get a break from the pressures of the exceptional, let us take a deep breath and make the most of Ordinary time. Feel the weekly rhythm of the lectionary without the distractions of the holidays. Study the lessons Jesus has given us about how to live our lives every ordinary day. For that is the beauty of Ordinary Time.


