Dear Friends,

Welcome to a new year according to the Christian calendar. Welcome to the holy season of Advent. There are four Sundays in this season, each leading us closer to the great celebration of Christmas. It is also a time during which we are to pay particular attention to Christ's promise that he will return at an unexpected moment. One of

the great spiritual disciplines encouraged in the life of every Christian is to live in readiness. Thus, Advent is a season of expectation marked by individual and communal acts befitting such preparation.

These preparatory acts include slowing down, waiting patiently, and living each day hopefully. Frankly, none of these practices are much honored in our world today. The lead-up to Christmas tends to be both frenetic and stressful. Waiting patiently for God is replaced by a seemingly unquenchable desire for instant gratification through material possessions wrapped in ribbon and foil. Furthermore, the fears and concerns we have about what is going on in our world today tend to overwhelm whatever hope



we hold for Christ's coming again. There is so much noise, worry, and distraction. It makes standing still and looking up into the night sky for that one bright sign of "God with us" almost impossible. That is the reason why we need this season of Advent all the more.

I have a suggestion. Make a commitment this Advent to intentionally spend time with the parents of Jesus prior to December 24th. Include Mary and Joseph in your holiday plans. Read with care the opening chapters of Matthew and Luke's gospels. Reflect on their lives and what their responses to Gabriel teach us about slowing down for God's sake, living both with patience and in hope of the infinite love and mercy made incarnate in that manger in Bethlehem. Discuss the stories of Mary and Joseph with your family and friends. Pray about what sort of revelation this might be. Think about what it means to respond, "Here I am" when God comes calling.

It seems to me that this is probably the best way to prepare, with expectation and joy, for Christmas Day.

VESTRY NOTES

Our Vestry met on Wednesday, November 18st for its monthly meeting. The minutes for the meeting will be filed and available for your review.

We received the Treasurer's reports which were basically the same as what Carol presented at the congregational meetings on Sunday, November 18th. Several recommendations from the Finance committee were received and approved. These are recorded in the minutes. Discussion followed regarding Trinity's 2016 budget and the status of our Stewardship Service Giving. The Finance committee will present a provisional 2016 budget to Vestry at the December meeting.

The meeting continued with all committee reports. To note a few highlights:

- Vestry approved the recommendation from Buildings/ Grounds Chairman to obtain a quote for a Facility Condition Assessment (FCA). If the FCA is approved for purchase, it will provide a detailed report to aid our current and future decisions regarding cost and scheduling of repairs and maintenance for our beautiful campus.
- Outreach will be making distributions to the Kamba Foundation, By His Wounds Ministry and the Winchester Food Bank.
- Music Ministry has a full plate of events through the Holiday season. They have made a particular effort to expand the Children's Choir which was clearly evident in their bright voices on Youth Sunday.

- Parish Life asks to be notified of any In-reach Ministry needs for Trinity members. Please let any Vestry member know if you are aware of these needs.
- Thrift Shop continues to be a blessing to our congregation and community through expanded sales using the funds to support a variety of missions.

Thanks to the leadership of Pamela Wynfield and the support of many new and former volunteers, the 2015 Trinity Christmas Auction is going to be a wonderful event! Please join us for the preview party on Friday December 4^{th} and again for the live auction on Sunday, December 6^{th} .

Stable Tour planning is well underway. If you can help with this important event that supports Trinity's Mission efforts, please let us know. This year's tour will be led by Gina Hammond who has an enthusiastic support group including several of our former Stable Tour leaders.

Your Vestry is committed to developing ideas and actions that will enhance the Faith, Place and Mission of Trinity Upperville. As we continue this journey, please let us know where you want to be included.

We are most appreciative of your support for this long standing program and look forward to hopefully continuing in 2016 for year 29 with our first meal beginning on Thursday, January 14 in Cox Hall and food service at SOME on Friday, January 15, 2016. Please consider joining us on this important mission. Details about the 2016 schedule will follow in the next few weeks, pending Outreach approval.

Little known facts about Trinity Episcopal Church - Upperville, VA

For our December issue, it is fitting to finish the buildings currently on the Trinity property. The stone Boiler Building is just behind and to the west of Cox Hall. This building houses two boilers supplying heat to the Church, Cox Hall and the Nursery. On the east side is a small storage area for hand garden equipment. Beside this area is an obsolete bathroom now used for storage. To the west of this building is a wooden frame shed housing the larger lawn equipment.

The last building is the gazebo in the middle of the south parking lot. In the summer, it is not unusual to see someone standing or sitting in the shade of this building, resting before continuing their journey.

NEW BEGINNINGS

At its core, the season of Advent is about beginnings. The term itself, from the Latin, means arrival or coming. In the Christian Church it is the beginning of the liturgical year and celebrates the time of preparation for the coming of the birth of Christ, the greatest of all beginnings. The church recognizes Advent in many meaningful ways but perhaps none are more wonderful than in the faces of the children who represent a never ending beginning.

This past summer was something of an ending in our children's programs as John Knouse, our much loved Director of Family Ministries, departed Trinity for new opportunities in the greener pastures to our south. While we miss John greatly and are pleased to hear of his many successes in Warrenton, every ending creates a new beginning.

It didn't look that way at first as we began the fall with no sign of a replacement for John, but things changed quickly. Gina Hammond took up the slack in Children's Chapel, implementing a new Sunday school component to this highly successful program. Lillian Griber continued her amazing work giving Trinity the largest compliment of devoted acolytes one could imagine for a church this size, and The Reverend Banse along with his wife

Janie began work themselves on continuing the Youth Groups.

Our children's choirs participation also suffered as their rehearsals had been a part of the Trinity After School Program which was discontinued in John's absence. On the first day of rehearsals in September we had one child. The solution to this came in the form of Lillian Griber. As though she didn't already have her hands full, she agreed to help with the Choristers and began to work the same kind of recruiting magic she has done with the acolytes. The next week there were two, and then four, then eight, and by October we had one of the largest groups of choristers we have had in years. It has truly been a joy to behold as they have grown in number, skill, and devotion.

The choristers will be singing on the second Sunday of Advent, again for the Christmas Pageant on the fourth Sunday of Advent, and then will be the primary choir for the Family Service at 4:00 pm on Christmas Eve. You can see the joy in their faces and certainly hear it in their voices. It is the sound of angels, a new beginning, preparing the way of the Lord. It is the sound of Advent and the voice of the future of the church.


Coming in Spring 2016: Jerry Eisley, "Exploring Sacred Space: Art and Mindfulness"
