My Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

"All of us go down to the dust; yet even at the grave we make our song: Alleluia, alleluia, alleluia." (BCP, p.499)

We celebrated the life of Mrs. Rachel Mellon this past Friday. She lived into the spring of her 103rd year, and over the course of those decades, served as a gracious anchor for the communities of which she was a part. We here at Trinity were especially blessed by her love and service in and through the church and grounds that we so enjoy. I can tell you that, in all my travels, I have found few sacred spaces as beautiful and inspiring as Trinity. May you and I never take this for granted.

In my conversations with her, Mrs. Mellon described her thoughts and the beliefs that informed the vision for the present church. She had a deep appreciation for the French countryside and the importance of the community gathered as a village or town. She believed that the church should represent the spiritual center of that community and that all should be welcomed. She knew that the greatest cathedral of all was the glory of God revealed in creation, and that, in building a church, the people must seek to imitate that glory both humbly and with the greatest of care. She believed that God was both transcendent and a friend. The church should be a place where one could come and converse with that friend.

There is no doubt in my mind that that vision was accomplished.

Rachel Mellon now rests in God, as do the souls of all the departed. That is the promise made to us by our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. This is the hope that we are now preparing to celebrate. Without getting ahead of ourselves (we still have several weeks of Lent and then Holy Week yet to


travel), we will gather on Sunday, April 20th, to celebrate the great mystery of the empty tomb. You see, Easter is not about denying our mortality. As the services of Holy Week will remind us, the grave awaits us all. But we do not need to be afraid of our mortality. Instead, we are people of the resurrection. We have been set free to live as fully and faithfully as possible in the days granted to us, serving others as the embodiment of Christ's love for all the world. And when our moment comes, we will rejoice, because the grave will not be the end of our existence, but rather the gateway to the eternal presence of the Transcendent God, who is also our greatest friend.

I look forward to continuing this journey through Lent and Holy Week with you. I will also look forward to standing with you before the empty tomb on Easter day, singing that song: "Alleluia, alleluia, alleluia."

Vestry Notes

Gina Hammond, Senior Warden

The Vestry held its regularly scheduled meeting on Tuesday, March 13, 2014. Gina Hammond, Senior Warden, presided over the meeting in the Rector's absence. She began with an opening prayer, mindful of Rachel Mellon's death and recalling the wonderful lessons of stewardship she and her husband taught us. Bob Appenzeller shared a bible reading.

The minutes of the February 19, 2014 Vestry meeting were approved as submitted. This document is available on the bulletin board in Cox Hall.

New Business Items:

- February Profit and Loss Statement: Gina Hammond reported in the Treasurer's absence. The February income and expenses are in line with budgeted amounts.
- The Finance Committee revised its resolution of February 2014 re the Gulick house. The renter will now continue on a month-to-month basis. The fuel tank has been moved back into the Church's name. We will invoice the tenant for these costs. The Vestry recommended that we be charitable in our payment plan as the costs of fuel have been very high this winter.
- Jolly de Give brought forth a problem with bagged refuse appearing on the property. A letter will be written to our

- neighbors identifying the problem and seeking their support in correcting it.
- The Buildings Grounds Committee shared their outline for the Strategic Planning document. Clarifications were made as to the type of data that needs to be collected. A spreadsheet format will be developed and coordinated with Beth Rogers so that it will be easy for her to update as repairs are made. The spreadsheet will also be constructed to allow for the sorting of "Upcoming Repair Dates" by year to enable better budgeting and scheduling.
- Wayne Gibbens reported on the current work of the Nominating Committee. The Committee has reviewed the names of all eligible parishioners from the current roster. They requested permission to propose a single slate of four candidates for the Annual Meeting. This was approved by the Vestry. However, according to our bylaws, parishioners may still propose additional candidates if so desired. The discussion continued with suggestions for making the Annual Meeting into a luncheon with upbeat presentations on the work of the parish. Margaret Moore will consult with the Parish Life Committee for their additional input. Further discussion will take place at the next Vestry Meeting.

 Delegates were elected to represent Trinity Church at the next Diocesan Annual Council Meeting. Barbara Augenblick will continue as our delegate; Mark Thompson will serve as the alternate.

Old Business Items included:

 Book of Remembrance Guidelines: Research is continuing into current definitions of how funds may be spent. Input is being requested from the Endowment Committee on guidelines that they use for gifts that they receive.

Committee reports were given as follows:

- The Stewardship Committee reported that 174 pledges have been received valued at \$567,416.
 We are still waiting to hear from 27 individuals/families who made gifts last year but have not yet submitted a Commitment Card.
- Pamela Wynfield shared preliminary plans for the Parish Retreat at Shrine Mont, June 27-29, 2014. There will be many opportunities for parishioners to enjoy the resources at Shrine Mont.
- Written reports were also received from Buildings and Grounds, Family Ministries, the Healing Ministry and the Music Committee.

Join us for singing around a campfire with S'mores, an ice-cream social, hiking, painting "en plein air," outdoor games (horseshoes, croquet, bocce ball, sand volleyball, tennis), swimming, a knitting party, fly-fishing instruction and casting practice, zip-lining, walking a labyrinth, and worshiping at the outdoor Cathedral Shrine of the Transfiguration.

The Virginia House was completed in 1873. With its white clapboard structure and tall, green-shuttered windows, the Virginia House is four stories high. The 96,000 square-foot building includes a 5,000 square foot Ball Room and a 40 foot by 150 foot dining hall. The Virginia House is listed in the National Register of Historic Places.



The Cathedral Shrine of the Transfiguration, an open-air cathedral of the Diocese of Virginia, was consecrated in 1925. Each of its stones was pulled by horse or rolled by local people from the mountain that embraces it. The baptismal font was originally a dugout stone used by Indians to grind corn. The Shrine is the site of regular weekly worship.

Little known facts about Trinity Episcopal Church – Upperville, VA

One of the little-known resources at Trinity is the "Book of Remembrance". The actual book was presented to the congregation on September 6, 1953 at the first service held in the Parish Hall. This book was donated by Brig. General John B. Rose & Mary Keith Rose of Warrenton in memory of John Armistead Dulany as recorded in the first book entry, November 1, 1953. The stand for the book was made by Isham Keith, who lived in the "Keith House" and whose workshop was in the "Brick Cottage". This book and stand are in the South Transept and each

entry is a gift to the fund in honor of, or in memory of a loved one or someone's service to Trinity.

The Book of Remembrance fund was established in 1953 and over the years the fund was designated for maintenance of the "fabric of the church". It has been carefully managed by the Trinity Rectors and Vestries for over 60 years and used to replace altar frontals, prayer books, Bibles and clergy and choir vestments as they become worn. The most recent expenditures (2008 -Feb. 2014) from this fund have been:

- New Bibles, replacement prayer books, and hymnals
 almost \$3000
- New altar frontals & vestments – over \$16,500
- Repair needlepoint over \$2,500

Gifts to the book of Remembrance fund continue to be accepted for the "fabric of the church" and continued prudent management will guarantee similar items will be replaced well into the future.

"The Seven Last Words of Christ, Opus 51 for string quartet by Franz JosephHaydn

At Trinity on Good Friday, April 18th at 7pm

The original 1786 work, was for a full classical orchestra. At the request of his publisher, Artaria, the composer in 1787 produced a reduced version for string quartet: Haydn's Opus 51. This is the form in which the music is most often heard today: a group of seven works with the Introduction abutting Sonata I and Sonata VII joined by the Earthquake. The first violin part includes the Latin text directly under the notes, which "speak" the words musically.

We will be performing this work for string quartet. The members of the quartet are Jason J. Labrador (Violin), Teresa Gordon (Violin), Heather Austin-Stone (Viola), and Camilo Perez-Mejia (Cello).
