Vestry Notes

Gina Hammond, Senior Warden

The Vestry held its regularly scheduled meeting on Wednesday June 18, 2014. The Rev. Robert L. Banse, Jr., Rector, presided. He began with opening prayers. Margaret Moore shared a daily meditations on fellowship from a book her grandmother gave her.

The minutes of the May 21, 2014 Vestry meeting were approved with one amendment. This document is available on the bulletin board in Cox Hall.

New Business Items:

- Treasurer Charles Ince reported on the financials through May 2014. Expenses are slightly under budget and income is ahead of budget. This is a good position for going into the summer months.
- Rob Banse reported on the successful 2014
 Stable Tour. Having beautiful weather, four new venues and a \$20,000 anonymous gift were significant factors in impacting funds received. Final accounting is in process. It is estimated that the proceeds will exceed \$80,000. We are now looking for new chairs for 2015. Stephanie Bates has agreed to mentor these individuals. The Vestry recommended that our publications emphasize that this money is all being used for Outreach.
- A discussion was held on how we might involve more people in our activities at Church. The Vestry moved into executive session for this portion of the meeting.
- Moving out of executive session, the Rector continued his discussion of 2014 objectives. He has received many good comments from Vestry members on what they would like to see at Trinity. He also acknowledged, having now experienced what he characterized as activity equivalent to three Holy Weeks and Easters this spring that a review of our staffing needs is appropriate. He acknowledged that it is time to add another clergy person to the staff. The Vestry will set up a separate committee, to include members of the congregation, to help with a review of our needs. The consensus is that this is a moment of CELEBRATION, as it reflects the growth we are witnessing. This study will be the number one priority for the summer with a report expected in October 2014.
- Bob Appenzeller reported on the methodology that the Outreach Committee is using to determine what needs should be funded. He presented a spreadsheet with over 20 organizations whose funding requests are being considered. These involve both do-

- mestic and international candidates. The committee is working to obtain completed Outreach requests (available at http://www.trinityupperville.org/Outreach/) from these organizations.
- Margaret Moore reported on ideas for the Annual Meeting. This will be held in conjunction with the Country Fair on October 5, 2014. A single service will be held at 9 am, followed by the Annual Meeting. This will be kept to a minimum number of reports, and will focus on celebrating the activities of the past year. A pot luck meal will then be held, featuring Tommy Breeden's BBO.

Old Business Items:

- The Rector gave an update on the status of the current efforts to increase the Endowment. All Vestry members have been visited. Rob reported that an additional \$900,000 has been pledged as commitments to the Meade Society (i.e., gifts to be received on the death of an individual). \$30,000 in outright gifts have also been received. The Rector and his wife, Janie, plan to make gifts of both types. The remainder of the summer will be spent getting other lead gift givers before the larger congregation is solicited.
- Plans are underway to use the Outdoor Chapel more frequently. On a monthly basis, we will have fellowship and an evening service. These events will begin at 6:30 pm and conclude by 8 pm. The Church will furnish the meat for grilling and drinks for the evening. Attendees are asked to bring a side dish and/or dessert to share. Dates scheduled are June 25, July 23 and August 27. A once-a-month Saturday evening 5:30 pm Eucharist will also begin in the fall.
- A letter has been sent to our neighbors on Route 50 who border our Outdoor Sanctuary. We are seeking their support in keeping the back of their properties clear of debris.
- Jolly de Give gave a report on negotiations being held with the current tenants of the Gulick House. They have made an offer to help reduce their outstanding utility bills incurred during the severe winter conditions. The Finance Committee will review their request.
- Pamela Wynfield reported that 25 persons are planning to attend the parish retreat at Shrine Mont.
- Gina Hammond reported that letters have been sent to all parishioners for whom information is incomplete on our database.

- Having this information will allow the impacted individuals to be able to vote at the Annual Meeting.
- The Trinity Wedding Procedures are also being updated. A draft has been provided to the Rector and the affected staff. When approved, these will be posted to Trinity's Website.

Committee reports were received.

- The Nominating Committee has secured four candidates (see biographies on pages 4-5)
- The Healing Ministry, having recently added three more members, will begin having Healing Ministers at the 8 am service once a month. This ministry is also willing to share its study of the healing ministry of Jesus with the whole congregation via the forums. This offer was referred to the Adult Education Committee.
- The Outdoor Chapel Committee is seeking persons to help fill the gator bags on the trees. This needs to be done weekly, and takes about 2 hours to complete. Persons interested in helping should contact Wayne Gibbens.

Gina Hammond gave the Wardens Report. Thank yous were extended:

- To Stephanie Bates and Cindy Thompson, the church staff and all the many, many volunteers for their efforts in bringing forth a very successful outcome to the Stable Tour.
- To Ellen Hall for her leadership of the Thrift Shop, and her creative ideas for marketing its treasures; Cindy Thompson is now the new chair of the Thrift Shop.
- To the Flower Guild for their extraordinary talents, especially in making splendid arrangements for many weddings and funerals in May and June.

Gina reminded the Vestry that the Church does not close down for the summer. She urged everyone to welcome our visitors on Sunday mornings, share a copy of our new brochure on the Outdoor Sanctuary, and invite them to coffee hour. If children are present, they may visit the nursery or make use of books found at "Miss Charlotte's Corner" in the north transept.

The meeting concluded at 9:00 pm with final prayers.



There will be one service at 9:30 a.m.

The Episcopal Diocese of Virginia Canon 11, section 4: Only Lay persons who are confirmed adult communicants in good standing of the church, as defined in General Convention Canon 1.17., shall be eligible for election as Vestry members of such church. However, regardless of eligibility of a person for election, no person shall be elected at duly convened congregational meeting to consecutive full terms on a congregation's Vestry or Vestry Committee.

Election FAQ's

Can I vote by proxy?

No: "The Voting shall be by ballot in person and unless otherwise provided by the meeting, a majority of the votes cast shall be necessary to a choice. There shall be no voting by proxy." ~Diocesan Canon 11.5

Who is eligible to vote?

"All adult communicants in good standing, registered in the particular Church in which they offer to vote, shall be entitled to vote at the election of Vestry members." ~Diocesan Canon 11.5

What exactly does Canon 11.5 mean?

Adults are anyone age 16 & older. Communicant in good standing means that for the previous year you have been faithful in corporate worship, unless for good cause prevented, and have been faithful in working, praying, and giving for the spread of the Kingdom of God. ~Constitution & Canon I.17.3 To be registered means that your baptism date is recorded in the Parish Register.

What do I do if I don't see my name on the voting roster? (this will be posted in Cox Hall in September)

Díd You Know?

Little known facts about Trinity Episcopal Church – Upperville, VA

The Weathervane

The weathervane, the work of B. Eustbouts of Astau, Holland, is a rooster or "cock"; cast in bronze and covered with gold leaf.

This symbol is long associated with St. Peter and the denial of his association with Jesus Christ. "... before the cock crow twice, thou shalt deny me thrice." (Mark 14:30)

The late Rev. Robert Cox is often mentioned as quoting a medieval saying, "The angels, arising each morning in Heaven, sing out their praises to God and on earth the cock hears and echoes their songs."

(The preceding is quoted from <u>Trinity Episcopal Church</u> by George H. Glaysher (1973) Footnote #9 c.)

This weathervane looks relatively small when in place on top of the church steeple but in fact is very large, standing nearly five (5) feet tall. It has been removed two times since its original installation; once in the late 1970s or early 1980s because it was bent during a hurricane. The second time was in 2009 to have the gold leaf restored by a local craftsman.

It is always wonderful to see this bright beacon when approaching Upperville from any direction.

May you enjoy a summer of simplicity!!

The Art of Living Simply: Making More of Less

"Truly I tell you, whoever does not receive the kingdom of God as a little child will never enter it." ~ Jesus

"Simplify, simplify, simplify." ~ Henry David Thoreau, Walden.

Rules for a simpler lifestyle cannot be universal rules. We are responsible for their imagination and situation. Nor is a simpler lifestyle a panacea for what ails. But, a simpler lifestyle can be an act of faith as a matter of personal integrity and commitment to a more just distribution of the world's scarce resources. It can be a resolution against a mindset that calls for overconsumption.

Jesus called his disciples to become simpler like a child. Withdrawal from the often neurotic pressure of our materialistic society can be a response to that call. It can be an act of solidarity with the vast majority of humanity which lacks the range for choices we enjoy.

A simpler lifestyle can be a way to share with

those who have less and a way of returning to them what is usurped by unjust social and economic structures. Assuming a stance of under-consumption can be provocative invitation to others into a conversation about affluence, poverty and social justice.

Our faith is not about authority or rules. It's about service and relationship. We are asked to bring about the kingdom here and now. Simpler can be a way of anticipating that kingdom when God's justice will right power relationships and resource allocation. A simpler lifestyle can be an act of advocacy for legal changes that will right corrupted patterns of production that disregard the earth and its creatures and over-consumption by a fraction of the population.

Simplifying our demands can align with our needs, redirecting production from Madison Avenue-inspired wants toward goods and services that will satisfy genuine needs.

Do I believe that if I adopt a simpler lifestyle I am going to end poverty and that my actions are going to directly benefit the dispossessed? Maybe yes, maybe no. But any demand for proof of effectiveness only plays into the myth that the poor are the problem and that the rich have the solution.

Ways to Simplify Your Life:

- * Decide what's most important to you. What do you value most?
- * List your current commitments and evaluate them in light of these values. What do you want to be doing with your precious time?

- * Simplify work tasks. Focus on the essential tasks and eliminate the rest.
- * Do one thing at a time. Multi-tasking is more complicated, more stressful, and generally less productive.
- * Sort through your stuff. Pick a room or a closet or a work area and do a thorough purging. Separate into three piles: keep, give away, and trash.
- * Simplify your wardrobe. Give away things you haven't worn in the past year.
- * Limit your purchases. Buy less stuff. Ask yourself if you really need this and if you really need to own this before purchasing it.
- * Have a place for everything.
- * Limit your communications. Decide when and how much time you will devote to email, IM, phone calls, etc.
- * Eat slowly. Slow down to lose weight, improve digestion, and enjoy life more.
- * Exercise. It helps burn off stress and makes you feel better.
- * Spend time with the people you love.
- * Spend time alone. Learn to meditate.
- * Slow down. Live life more deliberately.

Always ask: Will this simplify my life? If the answer is no, reconsider.

A Village is Rising in the Countryside

At Helping Haitian Angels, we're building a new village for our children. It's almost time to move out of a crowded rented building in Cap Haitien to a new 40-acre campus in a small community known as "Declé." In the new village, a resident "mama" and ten children will live in each of eight "family" homes. The campus will include a school and church, as well as a farm which will provide about 80 percent of our food.

Our program is to love our kids and provide for their needs as they grow up, including food, clothing, shelter and the opportunity to love God. As they grow old enough to "age out" of the orphanage, we help them to learn the life and work skills which will allow them to become productive members of Haitian society.

On a recent trip, to plan for an electrical distribution system, I saw the village rising in the countryside. The first phase of building is well underway. A community center, which will also be the church, is nearly complete; it includes a kitchen and a laundry, as well as a

large, open-air pavilion. This spring, Easter church services were held in the new building! There were several courses of blocks on one of the houses, and the foundation had been poured for a second. Clean water is already available from a deep well—a wonderful gift and blessing from Trinity Church.

The first four houses will be completed in July, and the children will move to the new campus, as our lease on the Cap Haitien house comes to an end. We hope to complete a ten-room school before the fall, then build the remaining four houses. A home for the resident director, housing for visiting volunteers, dormitories for young people transitioning out of the orphanage, and a building for administration and medical clinic are planned for later phases.

Our neighbors at Declé look forward to the new village! They will be invited to attend church, and their children will be able to go to the new school. Trinity's well may even be able to provide potable water for the community. ~Bill Easton
