Earlier in the week, there was a crucial item missing from our standing order at Schenck Foods but the problem was quickly remedied with a side trip to Costco for a large bag of rice. Then, as the crew was busily chopping vegetables, it was determined that the ovens may not be heating properly and master fixer Tommy Breeden was dispatched to seek the appropriate repair. The casseroles were ready in due time.

Rain pelleted the area at a fast clip and caused flooding and massive traffic along the route to Washington, D.C. but once again driver Shapiro was able to get the van where it needed to be. Vestry Notes

Gina Hammond, Senior Warden

The Vestry held its regularly scheduled meeting on Wednesday May, 2014. The Rev. Robert L. Banse, Jr., Rector, presided. He began with opening prayers. John Johnson shared a daily meditations from the website truthforlife.org.

The minutes of the April 9, 2014 Vestry meeting were approved as submitted. This document is available on the bulletin board in Cox Hall.

New Business Items:

- Nicky Perry and Ellen Hall made a presentation on efforts to improve our endowment resources. They shared a pamphlet showing all the buildings that we are responsible for maintaining. The craftsmanship that created these structures cannot be found easily if repairs are needed. Increasing the endowment will enable us to maintain these resources without impacting our annual budget.
- April Profit and Loss Statement: Charles Ince, treasurer, reported that the Profit and Loss statement reflected a net income of \$33,779.65 for the month. All expense lines are tracking to the budgeted amounts. Expenses for Rachel Mellon's funeral have been paid in full.
- John Johnson reviewed the recent Finance Committee meeting. Pledges are being paid within current projections. The Committee endorsed a review of fees for weddings. An update was made on the status of utility payments for the Gulick House. A check has been received for almost 25% of the outstanding balance.
- The Rector continued the discussion on 2014 objectives. He recapped all of the services that have taken place since Holy Week. Trinity Church is an important resource for the **whole** community. He recalled what Dietrich Bonhoeffer says about the church's role – to pray, to do outreach and to proclaim the Good News of the Resurrection. Rob hopes to make more use of the Outdoor Chapel through the summer and fall. He endorsed the efforts to build endowment resources. Finally he indicated that he hopes to study more ways in which we can incorporate technology into our communications. He would like to be able to share classes, offer daily meditations, and expand audio of our services. This is an area which he plans to study further during the summer.
- The subject of housekeeping was raised. With the many activities going on at church, it is impossible for our part-time housekeeper to do a thorough cleaning after each event. She is not able to increase her hours. The Buildings Committee will research other cleaning services. It is likely that we will seek an additional part-time person, as this is the most cost-effective way to manage this budget item. Efforts will also be made to examine the many closets on the property and to remove any items that are no longer useful.
- Everyone was reminded that Trinity Church is a smoke-free campus. Please speak to anyone who may be unaware of this policy.

Old Business Items:

- An update was given on the progress of the Stable Tour. The weather forecast is looking favorable. Advanced ticket sales have been brisk.
- A letter will be sent to our neighbors on Route 50 that have property that abuts Trinity's Outdoor Sanctuary. Unsightly trash has appeared on our property in recent years.
- Registration is proceeding slowly for the Shrine Mont Retreat. The Vestry was encouraged to attend and promote this weekend.
- A letter will also be sent to all parishioners who have not completed necessary data needed to qualify as voting members of the congregation. The next Annual Meeting has been scheduled for October 5, 2014.

Committee reports were received. The Nominating Committee has secured three candidates to date. They continue to welcome names of others interested in serving. The Stewardship Committee reported that additional pledges continue to be received. Members of the committee are due to rotate off this spring. New committee members are needed. The Worship Committee reported on its meeting held earlier in the day. They reviewed the activities held during Holy Week and the Easter season. Jim Hammond will preside at services during Rob's vacation this summer. Written reports were received from Family Ministries, the Outdoor Sanctuary Committee and Outreach Ministry.

Gina Hammond gave the Wardens Report. Thank-yous were extended:

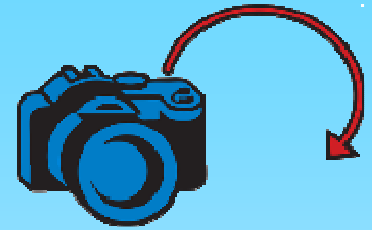
- For the many hours spent by members of the Trinity Staff, and Stephanie Bates and Cindy Thompson and their crew in the preparations for the Stable Tour.

Want to dig deeper into the Christian faith, study the Bible with greater intellectual integrity, learn more about church history, theological ideas and, most importantly, connect your faith (and doubts) more strongly to your own life experiences?

Then you may want to consider enrolling in *Education for the Ministry* – or “EfM” – a serious 4-year adult Christian Education course designed for committed lay students. The class convenes once a week on Tuesdays from September through May for 3 hours (11AM—2PM) at Emmanuel Episcopal Church in Middleburg and can require an additional 2-3 hours per week of personal study. The national program is managed by Sewanee Seminary and is administered locally via the Diocese of Virginia. Tuition is \$350 per year and scholarships are available.

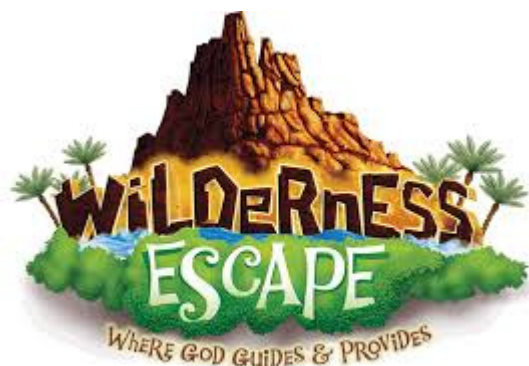

Did You Know?

Little known facts about Trinity Episcopal Church – Upperville, VA



The Trinity Bell Tower and Steeple is one of the most visible parts of our campus. While the church is not built on a high hill, this steeple can still be seen from miles around. With the wonderful tower clock, bells and golden weathervane, it is the focus of many church visitors as they first approach the building.

The tower was actually designed to have a clock face on three sides but was changed during construction to just one clock facing the courtyard. This clock and all the wall clocks on campus were once controlled by a main control in the Boiler House. When this system became inaccurate due to wear, it was too expensive to replace as a multi-

building system. A small microprocessor now controls the main clock. Most of the clocks in other buildings are battery powered. The top floor of the tower houses the bells. One may first notice many empty hooks on metal frames in this room. These were in place for the bells of a proposed carillon that could be played from the organ console on the main level. This idea was later abandoned due to concern over the amount of noise they may add to the village. The six bells were cast in England and the great bell is inscribed: “These bells are dedicated to the men of this countryside who, by the skill of their hands, have built this church.”

Notes From Christian

Christian Myers, Director of Music Ministries

One of the ways that we enhance our music for special occasions in the church is to use guest instrumentalists. We often have strings at Christmas or for other festival services such as the recent Bishop's visit and confirmation and may add a trumpet or woodwind to a particular anthem on a significant Sunday. However, I have always said that you really know something big is happening when there is a tuba which is something we generally save just for Easter.

Another thing I often say is that Pentecost is the most unappreciated of Christian festivals. Perhaps it is because Hallmark has yet to discover it or maybe because it comes at a time when we are focused on graduations or vacations, but Pentecost clearly does not get the attention that Christmas and Easter claim even though it is at least equally important. On the Day of Pentecost we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit, the final piece of the Trinity, one full third of God. In fact, one might argue that the Holy Spirit is the most important or at least most relevant of the three, being the part of God that is with us now and active in our daily lives. The Holy Spirit is often described as God the sustainer.

This year at Trinity Church we are going to make the most of Pentecost. Our special guests will be the Cathedral Brass from Vienna. Despite the fact that they are not associated with an actual cathedral and their home is in Northern Virginia not Austria, they are nonetheless an excellent entire brass choir comprised of

twenty some brass players, far more than we have at Christmas or Easter. The sound they create in our beautiful sanctuary is amazing but my favorite part of working with this group is that their manager and my contact person with them is, you guessed it, the tuba player.

Make sure to come early on Sunday, June 8 to hear the extended prelude by the Cathedral Brass as we welcome the gift of the Holy Spirit in our lives on the Festival Day of Pentecost.

Special Music in June

Sunday after Ascension, June 1 - "O Clap Your Hands," by Ralph Vaughan Williams, is the appointed psalm for the Day of Ascension on this Sunday immediately following it.

Pentecost Sunday, June 8 - Cathedral Brass. Prelude beginning at 10:15 a.m.

Trinity Sunday, June 15 - On our namesake Sunday we will reprise the music from the Bishop's service in May including the organ prelude "Theme and Variations on Veni Creator Spiritus" by Maurice Durufle and "Credo" from the Mass in G by Franz Schubert with choir organ and strings.

- To incorporate new members into church life and help to equip and motivate all members for their ministries.
- To attend a yearly Vestry Retreat.
- To make a financial pledge to the life of the Church.

Qualifications:

- Have a love of God and be committed to following Jesus Christ.
- Be an active communicant at Trinity who has participated in stewardship of the spiritual and material life of the Church.
- Have a fundamental knowledge of the congregation, programs and governance.
- Have a mutual relationship of trust and respect with the leadership of the Parish.
- Have a capacity for leadership within the Parish and the larger Church community.
- Be able to maintain confidentiality as needed.
