# REPORT FROM S.O.M.E.



It is often reported that the 29-year old SOME program at Trinity could not thrive without the generosity of our congregation. Be it prayerful support, help in the kitchen, traveling to DC, or making brownies, we would never manage to feed so many people over the years for so little money so consistently.

For our May effort, one parishioner deserves special mention. Gar Royer arrived in the Trinity parking lot as we were preparing the van for departure and handed over several loaves of freshly baked sourdough bread, still warm from the oven. Gar has mastered yeast bread, composed simply of yeast, flour, and water, featuring an egg white wash and sprinkled with pretzel salt. Not only did the SOME guests rave about this bread, but the Trinity staff fortunate enough to taste it were blown away. It

was determined that Gar could give any professional bakery a boost with his skills. We were blessed with other contributions from Jackie Eldridge, Sean Daly and Gina Hammond, among others.

Over 300 diners enjoyed our traditional battered fish lunch. The SOME kitchen was not in the best of shape, with one oven down and an ongoing plumbing issue that forced the closure of some main equipment. There was also no ice available. Lunch was served on paper plates. But in the single working sink, trusty dishwasher Mark Thompson overcame the messy serving pans, several left over from previous meals, with nary a complaint.

Joining Mark in the kitchen were: Jim Gemmer; John MacDonnell; Bob Appenzeller and Len Shapiro. The dessert station and serving line were capably managed by Nicky Perry, Mary MacDonnell and Ann MacLeod. Robin Keys also assisted.

Our beloved vegetable washer Sara Sisk was unable to join us in the kitchen the previous day and she was sorely missed. We also received an able assist from Tommy Breeden, who helped cart in the cooking supplies from Schenck Foods and loaded the van to DC, and from Betsy Crenshaw, who ordered our milk.

We will be returning to SOME on Friday July 15, 2016. This is our only summer service and we invite any youth over the age of 13 to join us in Washington, DC or in Cox Hall, Thursday, July 14, to chop vegetables. We promise you will personally find grace and glory in this outreach effort.

## VESTRY NOTES

Our Vestry met on Wednesday, May 18th for its monthly meeting. The minutes for the meeting will be filed and will be available for your review.

Let me start by saying we are very excited to have our new Assistant Rector, Rachel, join our team this month. We look forward to working and growing with Rachel. Particularly as we continue to develop our goal to re-establish, improve and enhance our Children/Youth and Family ministries. Welcome Rachel!!

Then-let me say this – Stable Tour, Stable Tour, Stable Tour!! I think it will be done by the time this note gets out so if you helped, thank you VERY much. If you were not able to this year, we hope that you will be able to join in next year. It's always a great time and there are some really beautiful farms that we don't get to poke around otherwise. Of course, that's not to mention that the proceeds funds our outreach efforts so it's really a big deal in our life at Trinity. Lastly- if you want to take a turn at being the 2017 Stable Tour Chair, please let me or any Vestry member know.

So we received our usual finance update from our Treasurer, Carol Miller. I want to give Carol a shout out for the wonderful support she is providing to the Vestry and to Trinity. Particularly as we begin the search for a new Parish Administrator, Carol has been spending a significant number of extra hours at the church making sure we stay on top of all financial matters. We remain in a good financial position. Next month we will be making our annual adjustment to the 2016 budget to account for pledges not received as planned and a few other necessary adjustments. At this point, no issues are anticipated. We will make the adjusted budget available to all as soon as it is finalized.

Issues from the Finance Committee included the recommendation to adopt a revised Gift Acceptance Policy to include a gift form that will be completed by donors. The Policy was accepted by Vestry. It will ensure that received gifts are handled correctly and there is a record of the donor's wishes. Finance Committee also reported that there was significant discussion at their May meeting regarding handling of financial matters while we are without a Parish

Administrator – see the paragraph above as the key here again is Carol!

Outreach committee reported that they have approved distributions to local programs in the amount of \$33,000 and national/international programs for \$3,000. They continue to meet regularly in order to discuss and analyze other fund requests to be sure that we are supporting worthwhile causes. To list a few, we have supported Piedmont Child Care Center, Churches of Upperville, ESL, SOME, Mobile Hope Loudoun and Kairos Prison Ministry. We will be asking for presentations from some of these organizations so you can all know more about them.

Never to be forgotten, our B+G Committee has been busily making repairs across the Trinity campus. Some you can see- refinished floors in Cox Hall, new fridge in the kitchen, Cox Hall and Peard House trim painting. Others you can't-foundation grading, heating system pump/valve replacements. We continue to work on getting Gulick House rented. During the heavy rains, there was a leak discovered in the roof which was promptly repaired. Once the interior dries out, it should be able to be shown again to potential renters.

Just so you know- Vestry will be holding a mini retreat on June 12th to continue working on our goal of Shepherding as we reported at the last Congregational Update. We will also start working with Rachel on the ministries assigned to her.

I think that should be it for this month.

It is with great appreciation that I thank the farm owners, and all our volunteers who helped to make the 57th Hunt Country Stable Tour a wonderful success. I also thank all of you who prayed so hard for beautiful weather which the Lord granted us for our event. To date, our net profits exceed \$50,500. I am hopeful that the figure will go a little higher as we account for final expenses.

Our Stable Tour typically has over \$18,000 in expenses. The generosity of over 70 patrons provided us \$20,000. An additional \$4,000 was received in donations, including personal gifts from each current Vestry member to fund our Volunteer Party. I wish to thank Lori Connelly-DeFranco who put on the beautiful and inviting Country Fair raising over \$1,000 in vendor payments. Marylin Bigelow helped to secure over \$8,000 in ads for our Program Brochure. Finally, Sydney and Ellen Hall graciously paid for and arranged delivery of all the lunches needed by our Trinity Volunteers and the farm workers.

The Hunt Country Stable Tour takes a lot of hard work from over 125 Trinity volunteers. But the rewards are great. Our Outreach Committee is eagerly awaiting news of our total proceeds. Through their conscientious efforts they will help to ensure that we are able to share Christ's love by addressing some of the many needs in our community, in our nation and abroad.

## IN CELEBRATION OF PAUL MELLON



The National Gallery of Art (NGA) is having a special exhibit of 80 drawings, watercolors, pastels, prints and illustrated books donated to the NGA by Paul Mellon. These works on paper, due to their sensitivity to light, are rarely on exhibit which is one reason why this exhibit is special.

A second reason why this exhibit is of particular interest to us at Trinity is that there are wonderful quotes from Mellon on the walls. You feel like you get to know the man: why he collected art, what it meant to him, how he liked to take his hammer and nails to change the pictures on the walls, and so forth. You feel like he is having a conversation with you as you see the exhibit. You have all summer to go, the exhibit ends on September 18, but going sooner is better than later. Open 7 days/week from 10-6.

Along with this exhibit the NGA has put out a brochure entitled: "A Lasting Legacy." In it are the floor plans to the rooms which hold Paul and Bunny Mellon's donated paintings along with Mellons' comments about the most important of these works of art.

Little known facts about Trinity Episcopal Church- Upperville, VA


The Stained Glass Window Restoration

Since some very obvious restoration work is in progress, it is a wonderful opportunity to remind everyone of the ongoing repairs and restoration at Trinity. As with any building over fifty years old, we continue to have repairs that are necessary for the operation of the Trinity buildings and normally these repairs or restorations are un-noticed by the casual visitor.

Now there is scaffolding in the church nave, thus is may be obvious that restoration work is being done to our magnificent stained-glass windows. After the original church construction, these windows were unprotected on the outside. In the early 1980's, it was recommended a clear plastic covering should be added to the outside of each irreplaceable stained-glass window in the church for protection from storms and to help contain some heat loss. This special plastic was soon installed and served for a number of years.

After time, the plastic began to deteriorate and became a smoky, semi-opaque covering that did not allow the true color of the windows to be seen and was not as strong or protective as when originally installed. In the 1990's, a new state-of-

the-art plastic covering replaced the old one and the windows were again viewed in their original magnificence.



Time and weather have again had their deteriorating effects and the windows are undergoing their most intensive restoration. Tempered glass will now cover the outside of the windows and the colors of the windows should be true for many years to come.

As a Small World item: The COO of the company performing the restoration, apprenticed with the Willet Stained Glass Studio of Philadelphia, PA. This company made the stained glass windows in the north transept.

age the business of the church. That's a very big job, and we are blessed to have the work distributed among the twelve members of the vestry. It is certainly an honor to serve on the vestry, but it is definitely not an honorary position. We are a working vestry.

So, why would anyone volunteer for such a demanding Because it offers an opportunity to position? serve: serve God, serve our church, and serve our fellow parishioners. Serving on the vestry requires a serious commitment, but the reward is great. You can rest assured that you will be deeply touched by the work you do and your efforts will deeply touch others. You will gain a much better understanding of how and why Trinity Upperville functions, and you will rest easy in the certain knowledge that you are doing God's work right here in your own time and place.
