My Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Do we really remember the things that matter most?

You know, it was not that long ago that we gathered to celebrate the joy of Christmas. Only two months have passed since the Advent wreath was fully lighted, angels and shepherds and assorted animals made their way down our center aisle, and the lyrics of "Silent Night" filled the church as a beautiful evening transitioned into a morning full of hope and promise. In that moment, we celebrated the incarnation of God's love in that holy infant and the realization that the created order had been changed forever.

But now the decorations have been removed. The evergreens have been taken down and the ornaments put away. The light of that Bethlehem star has faded. We have moved on, back into the daily routine, not thinking about that manger until December rolls around again. One of the saddest aspects of the human condition is how quickly we forget.

Lent is a season that calls us, above all things, to remember. First, we will be reminded that none of us are here forever. As we are marked with the ember ash of that first Wednesday, we will hear again words that we must take to heart: "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return." We are transitory beings. There is an urgency about living life fully, faithfully, and well. Being lulled into complacency about this is one of the great causes of our amnesia.

Throughout the season, we will begin each service with a Penitential Order. At that time, we will recite the commandments that God gave to Israel, and then, hear Jesus' commentary on the same: "Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind. This is the first and great commandment. And the second is like unto it: Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself. On these two commandments hang all the Law and the Prophets." These are no casual

words to "ho hum" about and then dismiss. This summary of the law we are to remember and then cherish every day of our lives.

Finally, we will make our way to the holy city of Jerusalem. There, we will re-enact the final days of the earthly life of the one whose birth we celebrated just two months ago. At the pivotal moment, we will stand at the foot of a cross, where this Jesus will whisper to his father on our behalf, "Forgive them". Then, when he has breathed his last, we will remember that God's love is here to stay, and that is a realization that we must not forget.

There will be a number of opportunities during Lent for us to gather and engage in this essential discipline of remembering. In addition to the liturgies on Sunday mornings and at the noon hour on Wednesdays, there will be forum hours focused on the subject of prayer and Wednesday evening suppers with a program following entitled, "Gospeled Lives". Further details may be found elsewhere in this Genesis and will be announced as Lent approaches.

Again, one of the great struggles we all face in life is the tendency to all too quickly forget. I invite and encourage you to come and join with your sisters and brothers here at Trinity as we seek throughout Lent to remember what matters most of all. (see schedule on page 2)

Vestry Notes

Gina Hammond, Senior Warden

The Vestry held its regularly scheduled meeting on February 19, 2014. The Rector began with opening prayers. Christian Coyner shared a reading with the group from Detrick Bonhoeffer's book "Psalms: The Prayer Book of the Bible".

The minutes of the January 15, 2014 Vestry meeting were approved as submitted. This document is available on the bulletin board in Cox Hall.

New Business Items:

- January Profit and Loss Statement: Treasurer Charles Ince stated that income and expenses are in line with budgeted amounts.
- Piedmont Child Care Center (PCCC Oyster Roast: Betsy Crenshaw and John Knouse brought forward plans for an Oyster Roast to be held in honor of PCCC's 30th anniversary to be celebrated on October 11, 2014.. Betsy gave a brief history of the PCCC which was originally housed in the basement of Cox Hall. The Vestry agreed to be a sponsor of this event for \$3000.
- The Finance Committee brought forth two resolutions which were approved. The first made modifications to the Draft 2014 Budget. Music concerts were funded for \$1000, capital expenditures were funded for \$10,000 and a provision of \$3,500 was made for a new phone system. A final 2014 budget was then approved with estimated income of \$947,342 and estimated expenses of \$944,763.

The second resolutions was to assume responsibility for the propane tank at the Gulick House. This will allow us to better manage usage and ensure that sufficient fuel is available to support the heating structure. The Church will bill the tenant for usage.

- Approval of the purchase of 40 new hymnals: These will be purchased through the Book of Remembrance.
- Announcement of the Nominating Committee for the Vestry class of 2015. Wayne Gibbens will chair the committee. Outgoing vestry members Christian Coyner, Jolly de Give and Margaret Moore will complete the committee.
- The 2013 Parochial Report: This was approved for submission to the Diocese.
 - Continued discussion of 2014 objectives: The Rector began with a discussion about the future of the church. The old hierarchical model of ministry will likely be replaced by a horizontal model where the local parish is in the frontline. The Vestry was asked to think about the following questions: How we maintain our buildings and still addressing the needs of our congregation/ community? Do we want to be in the Landlord business? Are we utilizing our facilities correctly to support our mission? These and other auestions will be examined in the Rector's Adult Forum and in future Vestry meetings.

Old Business Items included:


- A votive candle holder in the chapel: The Rector recommended that this idea continue to be tabled until an adult forum can be held.
- Book of Remembrance Guidelines: These are being researched for current definitions of how funds may be spent.

Committee reports were received as submitted. The Music Committee presented exciting plans for several concerts to be held at Trinity. The Outreach Committee has scheduled presentations by "A Place to Be" and Debbie Gale (on African ministries) for upcoming meetings.

Gina Hammond and Jolly de Give gave the Wardens Report. Thank you's were extended to Tommy Breeden for his hard work during the snowstorms, the youth for their wonderful Youth Sunday service, John Knouse and Betsy Crenshaw for their support to the Youth Ski Trip, and Neil Peddicord and Becky Hoecker for their thanksgiving tea for Altar Guild members. All vestry members were reminded to support the Annual Art Show rescheduled for the upcoming weekend.

The meeting concluded with a final prayer by the Rector. The next Vestry meeting is scheduled for Tuesday March 18, 2014 at 6:30 pm.

Little known facts about Trinity Episcopal Church – Upperville, VA

Our current church building is the third church building on this site. The second church developed cracks in the walls and a structural study was done. After the study was completed, a report was made to the Mary D. Neville Guild at Trinity (more on this Guild in a future article). The report stated it was not feasible to renovate the existing structure due to several structural problems and a replacement structure was

needed. Mrs. Mellon attended that Guild meeting and offered to discuss this with her husband, Paul. They decided to build a new church and accessory buildings with Mrs. Mellon as the guiding force in the design and construction of the new buildings.

The second church was torn down to allow for the construction of the new church, parish hall and rectory. The parish hall was the first building to be constructed and was used for church services during the more than 10 years of construction of the current church.

The congregation of Trinity owes a tremendous debt of gratitude to Rachael and Paul Mellon for their gift of this church and the accompanying buildings.


