DEAR FRIENDS,

This month of March will include the most important week in the life of the Christian community.

On March 20th, we will celebrate Palm Sunday. The palms we receive and our procession into the church remind us of our Lord's triumphal entry into Jerusalem as recorded in the Gospels. And yet, before that service is over, we will hear of the betrayal, arrest and crucifixion of this innocent man. This moment marks the beginning of Holy Week.

Throughout the week, we will have many opportunities to pray and reflect on the meaning and significance of these last days of Jesus' earthly life and how they have transformed your life and mine.

On Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday we will celebrate the Holy Eucharist at 12:00 noon at the main altar.

On Thursday evening, we share an Agape meal prepared for us by Tommy Breeden and then move into the church for the celebration of the Maundy Thursday liturgy. On this night, we recall Jesus' last supper with his disciples. The service concludes with the stripping of the altar and silence. For those who wish to participate, a prayer vigil follows. This is a time in which to watch and wait with Jesus as his betrayer approaches.

On Friday, that day Christians call "Good", we will remember the crucifixion, that moment in history that was both the end and the beginning.

And then, on Sunday morning, March 27th, we will rejoice!! Our Easter celebration will begin before dawn. We have invited the entire community to join us at the paschal bonfire before proceeding to the outdoor chapel for the sunrise service. Please help us to spread the word.

Easter will then be celebrated in the church at both 8:00 and 10:30am. The entire congregation is invited to share in providing for Coffee Hour after the services that day. There will be an Easter egg hunt for our children following the 10:30am service. There will also be a cross in the courtyard that we are invited to decorate with cut flowers as part of that morning's Alleluia!

A seminary professor of mine once reminded us that, "You cannot fully experience the joy of Easter without first participating in the events of Holy Week." I encourage you to take part in as many of these services as you can.

DID YOU KNOW?

Little known facts about Trinity Episcopal Church – Upperville, VA
The church interior – North Transept – "Miss Charlotte's Corner"

Too often, we attend Trinity but don't have the time to really look around at this magnificent building. The next few articles will describe some special places in the church interior.

From the dedication plaque:

THIS CHILDREN'S CORNER
IS GIVEN IN HONOR OF
CHARLOTTE HAXALL NOLAND
FOUNDER OF FOXCROFT SCHOOL

IN RECOGNITION
OF HER GREAT LOVE AND
UNDERSTANDING OF YOUTH
AD 1962

The most thorough descriptions are in the book about Trinity by George Glaysher, available at the church office for a nominal fee. An excerpt below:

"The four windows in the North Transept follow closely the general pattern of those in the South Transept. The Baptism of Jesus Christ by St. John the Baptist is carried into two separate windows facing directly north, dedicated to Mary Dulany Neville (1849 – 1935). To the west are two windows portraying Jesus Christ with children. The companion window shows many onlookers while Jesus is in the act of laying on hands. The windows are dedicated to Henry Rozier Dulany (1857 – 1940), and his wife Anne Willing Carter Dulany, (1863 – 1949). These windows were made by the Willet Studio, Philadelphia, Pa, in 1957.

ADULT FORUM

March 6: Kathryn Gemmer - "Part I - Discussing Dietrich Bonhoeffer: A Transformer of Faith as Revealed in his Book, The Cost of Discipleship." Dietrich Bonhoeffer was a renowned and beloved Christian minister, seminary professor, and theologian who was imprisoned and later executed by the Nazis. Discover the major themes of Dietrich Bonhoeffer's writing and speaking and how he not only helped transform an entire faith community in Germany during World War II, but how his beliefs continue to impact the Christian faith of people throughout the world today. "Drawing from the Sermon on the Mount...The Cost of Discipleship is a compelling statement of the demands of sacrifice and ethical consistency from a man whose life and thought were exemplary articulations of a new type of leadership inspired by the Gospel, and imbued with the spirit of Christian humanism and a creative sense of civic duty."

March 13: "How Virginia is Changing – and How It is Not": Dr. Stephen Farnsworth is a professor of Political Science and International Affairs as well as Director of the Center for Leadership and Media Studies at the University of Mary Washington. He will review election results and public opinion surveys in the Old Dominion to examine the changing nature of the state, the impact of gerrymandering and what he calls the growing "Washington-ization" of state government in Richmond.

VESTRY NOTES

Our Vestry met on Wednesday, February 17th for its monthly meeting. The minutes for the meeting will be filed and available for your review.

We received the Treasurer's reports, as usual, and I suppose it's a good thing that there is nothing unusual to report. We are following our planned budget; income and expenses are tracking as they should be. We received one new pledge for 2016 since my last note-thanks be to God for that. It's never too late to make your pledge and it helps us to be sure we can support the missions, programs and goals that we have set for the year.

Speaking of goals- as Rob reported at the Forum hour on February 21st, our Vestry has spent significant time and effort to develop some realistic and measurable goals for this year that will further our intent to support the Faith, Place and Mission of Trinity Church. I won't try to list them again here, but we will be making these goals available to the congregation and we will report our progress as we work toward achieving them. We created the goals from your input through the effort launched last Fall where you were asked what Trinity should be. We carefully deliberated and prayed about these goals and our future. We invite and request you to join us. As Rob said, one of our key words is engagement. We want you to engage with us in developing plans and actions to achieve our goals. We want to engage our newcomers at Trinity so

they will keep coming back and join us as members.

By the time this letter is published, Vestry will have had an initial planning meeting to discuss the results of the Facility Condition Assessment that we received last month. The report is available to anyone who would like to have a copy- just let us know. Our objective at the meeting will be to discuss and attempt to prioritize the list of recommendations which comes with a potential price tag of about \$1.8M. We have been given the gift of our beautiful campus and church buildings and we have a responsibility to make sure they are here for many generations to come. We will be reporting our plans and progress here too.

I want to use a bit of space to encourage you all to support and engage with our 2016 Stable Tour. I'm sure there will be another whole section in the "Genesis," but this is big and important event that will take all of us to be successful and supports our significant Outreach ministry. Please let Gina Hammond, our 2016 Chair, know if you can help.



Flowering of the Cross

The flowering of the cross has been traced back to the 6th century. It is an especially striking and beautiful way to symbolize the new life that emerges from the death on Good Friday. Traditionally before the Easter Sunday service starts, the cross is covered with real flowers and the top draped in white. The entire cross is covered with flowers and is placed prominently at the front of the church to symbolize the new life in our risen Lord to all the worshippers present on Easter Sunday morning. The contrast between the starkly bare cross that worshippers have seen for 40 days and the living flower cross of Easter Sunday dramatically and visually represents the new life that we are celebrating after witnessing the very instrument of death and endings transformed by Christ's rising.

This year, as you come to Easter Sunday Service, pause by the cross and add some flowers to it. You can bring flowers from your garden, or you can place flowers from the bucket provided by the Flower Guild. The Sunday School children and Youth Group are encouraged to participate.

AMERICAN BOYCHOIR


The American Boychoir has a longstanding connection with Trinity Church. In 1950 the Boychoir bought Albemarle, in Princeton, NJ, to be their new campus. The estate had been built by Rachel Mellon's father, Gerard Lambert, in 1917 and was Mrs. Mellon's childhood home. She continued to live on the grounds for a few years after the Boychoir moved there and became a long time benefactor of the choir. In 1999 the Boychoir sang for Paul Mellon's Memorial Service at the National Gallery of Art and then, in 2014, drove all night from New York, where they were filming a movie, to sing for Mrs. Mellon's Funeral Service here at Trinity.


Last year on a cold snowy night in February the American Boy-
