Did You Know?

Little known facts about Trinity Episcopal Church – Upperville, VA

Many visitors to the Trinity Campus presume the cemetery was part of the original plan for Trinity when, in fact, it is a recent addition. Until the development of the Trinity cemetery only two burials occurred on the church property. Mr. John Siebert's ashes were interred in the walls of the Second church and were moved to the walls of the present church during construction. Rev. Richard T. C. Peard is buried just to the south of the church entrance.

Over thirty years ago, Mr. Mellon approached the Vestry about possibly donating some land from his Skallerup farm recently purchased north of Trinity. The reasoning was two-fold. This would give Trinity ownership of the land immediately across the north boundary to protect the view shed. If the church was willing to have a cemetery, Mr. Mellon could move his family to a private, permanent cemetery from their original burial place on his farm at Rokeby.

Eventually, when all were in agreement, Mr. Mellon provided the land totaling about 30 acres and a master plan for the cemetery. Unfortunately, he died before work could begin on the cemetery. A plea to church members and family raised enough money to implement Mr. Mellon's plans.

The cemetery was consecrated on July 9, 1995 and is operated by a separate corporation from the church. There are 500 gravesites within the cemetery. Further information is available from Mr. Mayo Brown.


Kouth Sunday is Coming!

From the Assistant Rector

What a wonderful start we have had in this new program year! It's already November, the month of Thanksgiving, and I want you to know how grateful I am for the support and energy that each of you brings to the life and ministries of Trinity Church.

I just returned from Shrine Mont, one of the Diocese of Virginia's retreat centers located in Orkney Springs. It is a quiet and beautiful place, nestled in the Blue Ridge Mountains. I was there for a new clergy retreat and stayed on for the Bishops' Retreat (the fall gathering for all clergy in the diocese). One of the main points of the retreat was to encourage clergy to incorporate silence into their day, every day. It is a hard thing for clergy to do, and it is a hard thing for people in general to do. We don't have time for quiet. We're too busy working or driving kids to practices or talking on the phone or cooking dinner or fill in the blank. Besides time, let's face it; silence is downright uncomfortable. When we are left in silence with our thoughts, any number of things can be dragged up in our minds, and we're forced to confront them.

Creating space for silence and listening for God is incredibly important in our daily lives. As I have heard said on numerous occasions, "There's a reason why God gave us two ears and one mouth." We're too used to talking, texting, and putting our ear buds in whenever there is silence. Yet, in the silence (as in the noise), God is present, and it is up to us to create that space to be able to hear Him speaking. On numerous occasions, Jesus left the crowds of people and His disciples, so He could have some time alone and in silence.

Advent will begin at the end of this month. It is known as a time of preparation, as we read Scripture and pray and light candles, leading up to the birth of our Lord. Now is a great time to begin considering a spiritual discipline during Advent. People often think of disciplines as New Year's resolutions, giving up something to lose weight or depriving oneself of this or that thing. Spiritual disciplines are about growing deeper in relationship with God, which means they do not have to be about deprivation. They can also incorporate something in place of something else. Perhaps consider this Advent incorporating some daily silence in place of noise, whether it be 10 minutes in your office or outside during lunch break or 15 minutes on the porch in the morning or evening. That time, away from phones, computers, televisions, and conversations will be invaluable. Keep in mind Psalm 46:10: "Be still and know that I am God."

This Advent season, I will be committing to 15 minutes of silence a day, without any distractions. When you see me, please ask how it is going; it's great to be held accountable in Christian community. Please let Rob or me know how we can support you in your spiritual disciplines, as well.

November 6: The Sheriff's Community Outreach. Captain Ray Acors and Lieutenant Sean Healy from the Fauquier County Sheriff's Office will join us to discuss policing issues in the county and how Trinity can play a part in community outreach/youth programs.

November 13: Sacred Music in the Anglican Tradition of Stone Churches: Gifts and Challenges of Instruments in our Sanctuary. Dr. Paul Chandley will speak at forum about the history and qualities of our Aeolian Skinner organ and the Baldwin piano. He will also address the Anglican tradition of a stone cathedral as it relates to the acoustics for the organ, piano, and voices as well as other instruments. He will address musical topics to include the unique challenge of organ and piano maintenance in an environment of fluctuating humidity. This interactive lecture will be held in the front of our church as his wife Sophia Pavlenko plays selected sacred pieces to demonstrate the topic's main speaking points on both the organ and piano.

Paul Chandley received his undergraduate degree in performance from the University of North Carolina and his master's and doctoral degrees in performance from the University of Missouri – Kansas City Conservatory of Music. He is currently the Executive Director of the Trinity Music Academy in Troy, NC, Principal Conductor of Opera Experience Southeast, and Director of Music at the Trinity United Methodist Church. He has been a regular guest conductor for the Raleigh Symphony Orchestra, the Kiev Symphony, the Rockhill Opera Company, the Kansas City Opera Company and the Opera Company of North Carolina. His wife Sophia Pavlenko has toured extensively throughout the world and has traveled to all 48 states of the contiguous U.S. Over the last two years, she has presented 87 concerts in North Carolina alone. Her musical compositions, including her astounding 1st and 2nd Piano Concertos, have been featured by the Kiev Symphony and Chorus and the Raleigh Symphony Orchestra. Sophia has been featured on PBS television and in Our State Magazine for her contributions in bringing world caliber music to North Carolina.

November 20: Fauquier Free Clinic. Please join us to hear Rob Marino from the Fauquier Free Clinic. The Free Clinic works like a primary care doctor's office: a place to go when you have an earache or to manage your high blood pressure, when you have the flu or need to check your diabetes. The Free Clinic also offers Mental Health services on a limited basis and its Dental Clinic does preventive and emergency care, fillings, extractions and cleanings. The Free Clinic is one of the efforts funded by our Outreach Committee using proceeds from our annual stable tour.

That's because we have another outstanding class of new Vestry members and, combined with the rest of us, I know we are going to have a great year! It's also because I was blessed to have my Junior Warden, Ellen Hall, re-elected to her position as I could not be successful without her.

Okay-so here we go. Vestry met on Wednesday, October 19 for its monthly meeting. The minutes for the meeting will be posted in Cox Hall and available for your review.

Our new Vestry members, Martha Williamson, Troye Plaskitt, Jim Hoecker and Sandy Diday, were welcomed and given a primer for what will likely be expected of them for the upcoming year. We discussed the obligations of the Vestry and all Vestry members, both new and current, and signed the Oath of Allegiance for this year.

I am very happy to report that our Treasurer, Carol Miller and our Registrar, Jolly DeGive, have both agreed to serve another year. They are vital to all that we do. I will however, give a shout out to Stephanie Knapp for filling in on the Registrar job at this meeting while Jolly was out gallivanting around the world somewhere!

On to the business... We received the Treasurer's report on financials. While we continue to recover from the Summer slowdown, we are in position to end 2016 successfully. Yes, we are prayerful that you all will complete your 2016 pledges as you are making your 2017 pledge commitments. Both are crucial to making Trinity the thriving institution that we discussed at our annual meeting. The good news is, 33 pledges have been already been received for 2017 and 7 of those pledges were increases from the previous year- thanks be to God for that! Our goal is 100% participation in pledging from our congregation for 2017. Other business included approval of the health insurance plans for Trinity staff and the establishment of designated gift funds to support our Stewardship efforts.

We received an update from our Shepherding team and were told that the Ambassadors, the "ASK ME" volunteers, continue to grow and recently trained 14 members. We also received a report from Pamela Wynfield who has brought another great idea to Trinity. She attended an introduction to a program called Stephens Ministry, a one-to-one lay caring ministry designed to provide high-quality, confidential, Christ-centered care to Trinity members. We will continue to explore the establishment of this ministry at Trinity.

Vestry got an update from co-chair, Debra Latiolais, on the upcoming Christmas Auction. As you have read and will continue to hear in weekly announcements, this is going to be another exciting event! They continue to gather donations for the auction and have some really great additions for this year's auction that will occur on December 2-4. We hope that all of you will join us and bring your best bids. Please contact any Vestry member if you have items that you would like to donate as these funds support Trinity's operating budget for 2017.

Our Parish Administrator, Phil Mohr, reported that the efforts to update our website and social media presence are proceeding well. We are planning a launch in early November. The newly designed website will provide all of us and our many visitors an easier way to stay in touch with happenings at Trinity.

The Vestry Fall retreat has been scheduled for October 28-29. This first retreat of the year will provide an opportunity for the Vestry to continue building the foundation on which we will further the Faith, Place and Mission of Trinity. We hope and pray that you will support us!





Once upon a time, before wristwatches were computers and telephones were clocks, every village had a bell tower at its center, usually attached to the church. In addition to ringing on the hour and sometimes quarters, the tower bells would ring peals or melodies and ringers would pull heavy ropes to play the bells in just the right sequence. The problem was how to practice without the whole town hearing. And thus, handbells were invented so the ringers could rehearse these patterns in the privacy of the church basement. Eventually the handbells took on a life of their own and today church basements are full of handbell choirs that practice and play much more complicated music than could ever be done on the tower bells.

Although we practice upstairs in the Parish Hall, Trinity Church keeps both these traditions alive with our wonderful handbell choir and our traditional clock tower in the center of the village. While our fully mechanized tower bells are reliably doing their job, our handbell choir, which relies on human ringers is currently short a few.

Our Handbell Choir is a truly wonderful group of people who come together every Tuesday evening at 7:15 for rehearsal. In addition to preparing music to play in church they also enjoy great fellowship, supporting one another and the rest of our ministries in the greatest tradition of the church. Music reading ability is certainly a help but not completely necessary as many of our current ringers have learned this skill


along the way. Participation in the handbell choir is a great way to be involved in music at Trinity for those who are not singers or can't commit to being in
